Let's Go "Herping"!





Have you ever wanted to go looking for reptiles in their natural environment? Then you should give "herping" a try! Herpetology is the study of reptiles and amphibians. In scientific and zoo communities, these animals are sometimes called "herps" for short.

"Herping" is the act of looking for snakes and amphibians in their native habitats and observing their behavior.

Snake Sleuth Game (Adapted from an activity made by the California Academy of Sciences)

Have you ever tried to look for something using just your sense of smell? Snakes do this all the time while hunting for their prey and exploring their environment. What's even cooler is that snakes use their tongues to smell and not their noses. Channel these super sleuths and see how fast you can find something just by smelling!

What You Need:

- 2+ people to play
- Five cotton balls
- Zip top bag
- Hole Puncher
- Your favorite extract or essential oil

Set-Up:

- Punch a few holes through the top of the zip top bag below the zipper.
- Put two to three small drops of extract on each cotton ball.
- Put all the cotton balls into the bag and tightly seal the bag.

How to Play:

- Designate a playing space this can be a room inside or set boundaries outside.
- One person takes on the role of the "mouse" and everyone else playing is a "snake".
- All the "snakes" must leave the playing space for one minute while the "mouse" hides the bag. Make sure the bag can still be detectable by the "snakes" and not too well hidden.
- Call the "snakes" back and see how long it takes them to find the bag and who was the fastest snake.
